Catholic	A person who follows the Catholic Church and believes in its way of worshipping God.
Protestant	A person who follows a different Christian Church from the Catholic one.
King James I	The king of England when the Gunpowder Plot happened.
Robert Catesby	The man who made the plan to blow up the king and Parliament.
Houses of Parliament	A big building in London where important people meet to make laws for the country.
Gunpowder Plot	A secret plan to blow up the Houses of Parliament in 1605.
Gunpowder	A powder that can explode if it is set on fire.
Arrest	When the police or guards take someone because they have broken the law.
Tower of London	A very old castle in London where important prisoners were kept.
Thomas Percy	One of the men who helped with the Gunpowder Plot.
Monarch	A king or queen who rules a country.
Treason	When someone tries to harm or go against their king or queen.
Bonfire Night	A night on the 5th of November when people light bonfires and fireworks to remember Guy Fawkes.
Fireworks	Bright, colourful explosions in the sky used for celebrations.
Beyond living memory	Something that happened such a long time ago that no one alive today can remember it
