
- Ancient civilizations introduced new technology like the Greeks and its architecture.

Angles:	A group of people who came from Europe a long time ago and settled in England.
Saxons:	Another group of people from Europe who moved to England many years ago.
Jutes:	A group of people from Europe, like the Angles and Saxons, who came to live in England.
Frисians:	People from a place in Europe who also travelled to England a long time ago.
Scot:	A person from Scotland.
Root meaning:	The basic or original meaning of a word.
Settlement:	A place where people build homes and live together.
Village:	A small group of houses where people live, smaller than a town.
Weaver:	A person who makes cloth by weaving threads together.
Tanner:	Someone who makes leather from animal skins.
Smith:	A person who makes things out of metal, like tools or weapons.
Artefact:	An old object made by people a long time ago.
Excavation:	Digging in the ground to find old things, like artefacts.
Archaeology:	The study of old things that people left behind, like buildings or tools.
Paganism:	A belief in many gods or nature spirits, often practiced a long time ago.
Christianity:	A religion that believes in Jesus and one God.
Missionary:	A person who travels to teach others about their religion.
Cathedral:	A very large and important church.
Abbey:	A large church with buildings where monks or nuns live
